#### Dane County, WI and Landkreis Kassel, Germany Partnership

In 2007 Dane County entered into a cooperative agreement with Landkreis Kassel (Kassel County), Germany to form a sister county relationship. The purpose of the agreement is to exchange ideas and build economic partnerships regarding:

- Renewable energy and climate change mitigation
- Cultural exchanges
- Regional transportation systems

#### Landkreis Kassel, Germany

Landkreis Kassel, with a population of approximately 236,000, has a regional transport system and is home to both the University of Kassel and the Institute for Solar Energy Technologies. The area hosts a technology-based economy, particularly traffic logistics and renewable energy. Its main industries are systems technology for photovoltaics, the manufacturers of train engines, and automotive factories for Volkswagen and Daimler-Chrysler.

In the last 16 years, both Landkreis Kassel and Dane Counties have remained committed to the goals that were set forth in the 2007 cooperative agreement as demonstrated by many exchanges over the years. This timeline highlights those activities.



## 2008

Representatives from Landkreis Kassel came to Dane County to discuss water resource management, visit agri-businesses, tour an organic farm, and attend a performance and a Madison Mallards baseball game.

Landkreis Kassel's Fine Arts curator and local officials brought a Brothers Grimm themed exhibition, "Once Upon a Time..." to the Dane County Regional Airport Terminal. On display for the first time in North America, it also represents the start of the Kassel-Dane visual cultural exchange. Copies of the artwork remain on display in the Office of the Dane County Board of Supervisors.







Launched in 1955 to reintroduce Germans to the international cultural scene following World War II, *documenta* is now the world's largest modern art presentation and is held every five years. In part, this festival was created to demonstrate to the world that Germany had extinguished its Nazi ties by focusing on modern art, which had been suppressed under Nazi domination.

Artist Michael Velliquette was the first artist selected to represent Dane County at *documenta*. His project, entitled *Power Structure*, was a 12-foot-tall mixed-media sculpture, examining power and responsibility in the built form.

In June, Dane County welcomed Landkreis Kassel photographer Christian Schaudern as an Artist-In-Residence at Edgewood College. The Kassel-Dane Task Force selected the theme "Technology and Art" for this project.

Schauderna created new works in the Edgewood College Gallery, which were given jointly to Edgewood College and Dane County. His three photos elevate the banal objects of his daily surroundings into formal still lifes. In addition to Schauderna's photographs, Landkreis Kassel donated a complete set of *documenta* posters from 1955-2012 to Edgewood College.

## 2016

Dane County celebrated *documenta* 14 by featuring the only known complete collection of advertising posters from the storied German art show.

In June, the Madison College Big Band performed in Landkreis Kassel with the Edgar Knecht Trio in Rüsselsheim (in Hessen, Wisconsin's sister state in Germany) and in the Bergpark Wilhelmshöhe in the city of Kassel.

#### 2022

#### Interviews with EUARCA+ 2022 artists Helen Hawley and Angelica Contreras:

#### What is your professional background?

**Hawley:** I have a BFA from the Rhode Island School of Design and an MFA from the University of Wisconsin-Madison, and my practice is multidisciplinary, involving sculptures, paintings, and visual texts. I have supported myself by working as a studio assistant and short-term teaching appointments at various colleges and universities.

**Contreras:** I studied visual arts in Mexico a the University of Guadalajara and later completed a masters degree in art education at the same university. I paint mostly mixed media with themes of identity, tradition, and popular culture. I've shown my work in exhibitions both in Mexico and the U.S.. I currently live in Madison where I continue to create and showcase my art.

#### How did EUARCA+22 and documenta 15 influence/contribute towards your professional/personal/artistic life?

**Hawley:** Although the projects we produced stayed in Kassel, the influence on the work I have created since has been invaluable. I was inspired by construction methods I saw involving cardboard and ideas about sound and installation. I keep in touch with the artists, and the experience lives on in surprising ways.

**Contreras:** Euarca+22 brings artists from different parts of the world that have different points of views and work in work in diverse media, so it will be a great opportunity to research and reflect on the type of work I want to create in the future. As artists we tend to isolate ourselves, so this experience has allowed me to open myself to new mediums and languages and overall to the possibilities of art and its importance as a social and communal practice.

#### How have you shared this experience with others since returning?

**Hawley:** I would like others to know how vital travel opportunities and cultural exchanges are to artists. Not only do they make us really happy, but they are opportunities to converse with a global community. Feeling that I am a part of something bigger helps me approach my work both more seriously and joyfully.

**Contreras:** I was very excited to be invited as a guest artist speaker at the elementary school I work at. I made a small presentation about my work and included some slides about EUARCA+22. I explained what artists do, what inspires us, our process, etc. The children were very curious and asked many questions about my trip to Kassel. My intent is to further share my work and process with the community, so they understand the importance and possibilities that the arts can bring to their lives.

In June, following multiple cultural exchanges with Landkreis Kassel over the course of 15 years, a delegation including County Board Chair Patrick Miles, Supervisors Castillo, Erickson, and Pellebon, and County Clerk Scott McDonell traveled to Landkreis Kassel. The delegation was also joined by Charles James, long time member of the Kassel-Dane Sister County Task Force. They met with local officials and business leaders to discuss commonalities and collaboration opportunities related to economic development, renewable energy, and climate change, as well as to strengthen the sister county partnership.





The 2023 delegation met with officials from SMA Solar Technologies, SERA Hydrogen Technologies, Wirschatforderung (WFG) Kassel, the State Sports Association, and the Landkreis Kassel Government and noted multiple salient points and next steps to act on, such as:

- Dane County should explore federal subsidies from the Inflation Reduction Act for transportation and renewable energy infrastructure, and may be able to coordinate with US offices of SMA Solar.
- Connect artistic contacts from Dane County and Landkreis Kassel, and have artists visit to do training, performances, and work with students. Coordinate Madison College Big Band going to Landkreis Kassel in 2024.
- The delegation visited a refugee camp, and alternatively to what is depicted in the media in the U.S., in Landkreis Kassel, what it means is a good community with permanent housing, a pathway to citizenship if available, medical care, case management, education, and food security.
